

Western Ghats, India

25th November – 5th December 2017

Barry Reed, Steve Webb, and Simon King accompanied me on this trip to see the endemics of the Western Ghats. We were guided by the competent Setyan Mepayur (author of “The Shorebirds of Kerala”) and had an equally competent driver who drove our spacious minibus.

We managed to see all the target birds and did very well for night birds(though Bay Owl would have been a nice addition). It’s worth noting that Black-chinned Laughingthrush was split into four species shortly after the trip was planned. We managed to see two of the four, but the other two were out of range for the planned itinerary.

Green Warbler – constantly heard calling in the lowlands and a few seen well. Call similar to **Greenish Warbler**, but more drawn out, with tones reminiscent of Pied Wagtail.
Greenish Warbler – replaces Green Warbler on higher ground. Common, but mostly heard. Call more concise and hurried compared to Green Warbler.
Large-billed Leaf Warbler – a total of three birds
Western Crowned Warbler – one, Mudumalai
Blyth's Reed Warbler – constantly heard and occasionally seen
Sykes's Warbler – common at a single sight near Mudumalai
Plain Prinia

Brown-cheeked Fulvetta – three birds in total
Puff-throated Babbler – five birds in total
Rufous Babbler – eight, Idamalayar
Jungle Babbler – common around The Hornbill Camp
Yellow-billed Babbler – Chinnar and Mudumalai
Wynaad Laughingthrush – Periyar Tiger Reserve. On both visits, there was no sight or sound until near to dusk when the birds suddenly became active. They did not respond to tape. The reserve officially shuts before dusk which is presumably why this species is sometimes missed.

Indian Blue Robin – a single at Periyar Tiger Reserve
Nilgiri Blue Robin – missed at Doddabetta, despite spending several hours in torrential rain. Seen within minutes at dawn, with good weather, the following day at Cairnhill Forest Reserve
White-bellied Blue Robin – two, in Munnar area
Malabar Whistling Thrush – three birds seen, more heard
Black-and-orange Flycatcher – two pairs at Eravikulam National Park and Cairnhill Forest Reserve
Pied Bush Chat
Jerdon's Leafbird – four at Mudumalai
Golden-fronted Leafbird – two singles at Periyar Tiger Reserve
Pale-billed Flowerpecker – Mudumalai
Nilgiri Flowerpecker – three birds in total, Urulanthanni and Eravikulam National Park
